




Financial Overview


The Food Bank of Northwest Louisiana distributed food to 65,000 neighbors in 2022-2023. Each neighbor received food from the Food Bank of Northwest Louisiana free of charge. The Food Bank provided these services and products to all eligible individuals, regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, gender, age, physical and or mental ability. We ensured that our partners complied with all applicable State, Federal and local legal requirements through inspection and a contractual agreement. Each collaborating partner organization used client tracking software to prevent duplication of service and was monitored to avoid program misuse.

Our Programs:

FOOD AND EMERGENCY DISTRIBUTION:

In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, we distributed 11.5 million pounds of food with a value of \$17,417,697 to more than 65,000 children, women, men, seniors, veterans, homeless, disabled, unemployed and underemployed individuals living below the federal poverty level in Caddo, Bossier, Webster, Claiborne, Bienville Red River and DeSoto Parishes.

DISASTER RELIEF:

In times of disaster or a hurricane, the Food Bank swiftly mobilizes its resources to provide emergency food relief, collaborating with local agencies and partners to ensure timely distribution to affected communities. The focus is on addressing immediate nutritional needs and supporting recovery efforts by delivering essential supplies to those impacted by the crisis.

SENIOR BOX PROGRAM:

Each month we deliver a box of pantry staple foods to over 1,000 low income seniors throughout our seven parishes.

MOBILE PANTRY:

Perishable and non-perishable food are distributed to rural neighbors on a monthly basis.

KIDS CAFE® AFTER SCHOOL MEALS:

The Food Bank provides free meals for the for hungry children in after-school programs.

BACKPACK™ PROGRAM:

Chronically hungry children are provided with a weekly backpack of food to take home for the weekend and holidays. Each 7-10 pound bag includes items such as cereal, milk, fruit juice, and pop-top canned food.

SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM:

Nutritional breakfasts and lunches are provided for hungry children during the summer months. Food is provided at summer programs such as faith-based summer programs.


